# Did you know. . . CEEF projects are everywhere!

Would you be surprised to know that CEEF has been at work in Cape Elizabeth now for over 14 years? Would you also be surprised to know that critical components present in the High School, the Middle School and Pond Cove School — programs, spaces and resources that our students rely on each day — were the result of collaborations between visionaries within the school system and members of CEEF? Unless your child interacts with a CEEF grant funded initiative, CEEF may be an organization you simply recognize as having a positive impact on Cape's schools, but you may very well know little else.

The impact of grants — both large and small — across the entire Cape School System is extensive. The Pond Cove Math Lab, the Chewonki opportunity, and the High School Achievement Center are but three examples of large impact grants that have, and continue to have, a tangible impact on nearly every student in the course of his/her Cape Elizabeth education.

Three of last year's grants, the Freshman Academy imagined by Jeff Shedd and Nate Carpenter, Pond Cove's school wide celebration of Cape Elizabeth's 250th birthday, and the launch of the Open Minds Studio Makerspace in the Middle School, all have shown significant promise and have been lauded by students, faculty and parents.

Regarding grants approved this past fall, the initiative targeted to improve school nutrition, the Breakfast Smoothies program brought forth by Peter Esposito, and Elizabeth Johnston and John Holdridge's vision for a Middle School publication studio, could very well become mainstays in Cape's halls for years to come.

CEEF has remained on a steady and determined course for over a decade in its mission to foster innovation and excellence in Cape Elizabeth schools. Through a number of large grants and, just as importantly, smaller, targeted ones, CEEF has provided the necessary financial support to help our children push boundaries and learn in a myriad of ways that complements their classroom work.

CEEF — with your support and with the expertise and energy of our teachers and school leadership — is creating an exceptional school experience second to none in Maine. We are very glad that you are part of this, and we appreciate and encourage your ongoing support.

With each grant cycle, we are reminded how lucky our town is to have such dedicated and inspiring teachers and staff.

## Fall 2014 Grants

**Open Minds Studio Makerspace:** Mike Tracy, CEMS Principal, was awarded \$6,000 to reconfigure the Middle School's Industrial Technology classroom into a new space, affording students and teachers the opportunity to explore, through hands-on learning centered around woodworking, textiles, electronics, computer programming and multimedia creations.

**Original Band Composition:** Tom Lizotte, CEHS Band Director, was awarded \$3,000 for an original composition by Andrew Boysen based on the book *The Devil and the White City*. Lizotte motivated students with this piece "to reach beyond the usual parameters of performance and propel them to new musical heights and insights."



Takste International School Professional Development Program: Alina Perez, CEHS Pychologist, was awarded a \$2,000 stipend in support of her 5-week professional development program at Takste International School in Sikkim India. Through the program, Alina "stretched her communication and professional skills to their utmost." She has shared her experiences with the community, and applied new learning to the curriculum, and welcomed Takste students to Cape Elizabeth. (see events)

Interdisciplinary study of Cape Elizabeth History: Kelly Hasson, Pond Cove Principal, received a \$6,500 grant which funded an interdisciplinary study of Cape Elizabeth history through a study of Portland Headlight and marine resources for all six first grade classes. This grant fostered a greater appreciation among these young students for Cape Elizabeth's natural marine resources and the community's rich history by the sea.

# Spring 2015 Grants

Freshman Transition Coordination & Achievement Skills Program: Jeff Shedd and Nate Carpenter, CEHS Principal and Assistant Principal, received \$28,800 for a 2-year initiative integrating and improving several existing programs to aid students' transition to CEHS. This grant funds a half-time coordinator to create and implement an Achievement Skills and Habits Program for assisting students with the leap from middle school, as well as an improved peer-tutoring program, and a refreshed Freshlinks which connects incoming Freshmen with upperclassmen.

**High School and Pond Cove theatrical production:** Richard Mullen, CEHS Theatre Director, was awarded \$2,000 to provide technical and/or design support for a musical extravaganza that involves roughly 30 CEHS and 30 Pond Cove actors and a myriad of other students for lighting, set design, stage production, costumes, etc. The Little Mermaid will be the musical production this spring.

**Publication of individualized literary magazines:** Allison Hawkes, CEMS teacher, was awarded \$1,500 which funded a published magazine for sixth-grade students. Each student

wrote, illustrated, and designed his or her own magazine completed over the course of the year. They integrated a variety of writing genres, editing skills, art projects, photography, and desktop technology and shared a magazine of their own creation.

**Creative Publications:** Elizabeth Johnston, Instructional Coach, and John Holdridge, Volunteer/ Extended Learning Coordinator, received a \$1,900 grant for a Middle School publication studio where students produce newspapers, comic books, poetry chapbooks, original prints, and more. This project engages students and teachers in the creation/production/publication of words, ideas, and images.





# Fall 2015 Grants

**Global Collaboration:** Susan Dana, middle CEMS Foreign Language teacher, received a \$1,100 grant for Middle School students to plan, organize and implement collaborative projects and exchanges with students in Spain, Uruguay, and possibly Guatemala. This project ties into the World's Largest Lesson, created by the 2015 Global Goals for Sustainable Development and Unicef, and focuses on recycling, children and the environment.

**School Nutrition:** Peter Esposito, head of the School Nutrition Program, received a \$2,900 grant for student nutrition at all three schools through a new Breakfast Smoothies program. This project provides Vitamix Blenders in each school and benefit students through supercharged brain fuel, in the form of vitamin- and mineral-rich smoothies.

**Musical History:** Ted Jordan, CEHS Social Studies teacher, received a \$2,700 grant to fund a social studies program at the High School that introduces students to history through music. Concerts by two local bands shares historical stories behind their songs and engages in post-concert discussions. These musical experiences add new and unique context to the history the students have learned in class.

The Thompson Award, established by Tim and Nancy Thompson in memory of their son Timothy, recognizes a faculty or staff member who goes above and beyond the call of duty in reaching out and mentoring students. # CEEF grant comes full circle


